

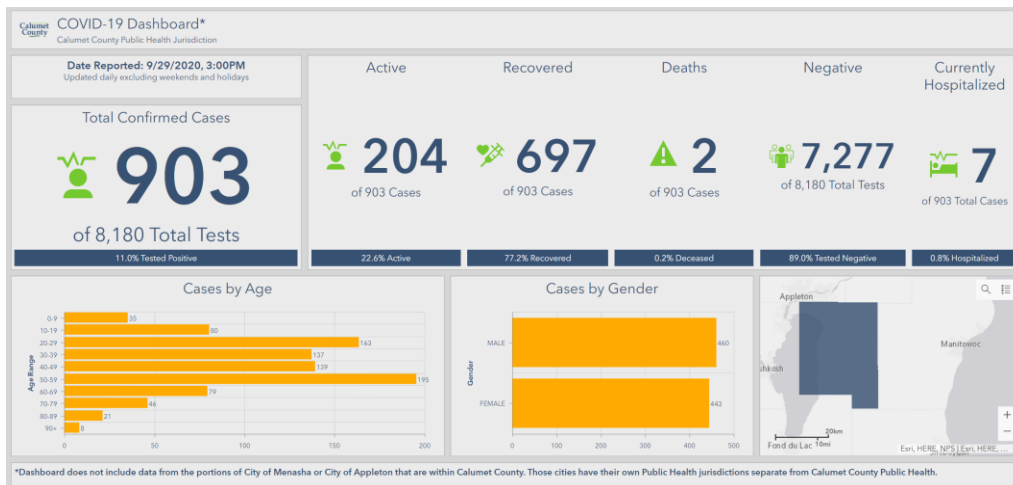

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Should employers notify other employees if they learn about a COVID-19 case in the workplace?

If an employer learns that a worker is confirmed to be infected with COVID-19, the employer should inform fellow workers who were in close contact with the individual that they were possibly exposed to COVID-19 in the workplace. Employers must maintain the confidentiality of the infected individual, as required by the Americans with Disabilities Act. In addition, employers must report the case to their local or tribal health department (LTHD) and follow guidance from the LTHD.

"Close contact" is defined as:

- Anyone who was within six feet of a person who tested positive for at least 15 minutes in a 24-hour period, starting from
 - Two days before the individual developed symptoms.
 - Two days before their positive test, if the individual did not have symptoms.
- Or someone who
 - Had direct physical contact with the person who tested positive, including but not limited to a hug or a handshake.

- Came into contact with the person's respiratory secretions, including but not limited to exposure to cough or sneeze droplets; contact with a used tissue; or sharing a drinking glass, towel, or other personal item.

New Hours for the Regional COVID-19 Testing Site in Oshkosh at Sunnyview Expo Center - Begin Wednesday, September 30, 2020

OSHKOSH, WIS. (September 28, 2020) – Beginning Wednesday, September 30, the COVID-19 regional testing site will be operating under new hours and will be open from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Friday and 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Saturday. The testing site is located at the Sunnyview Expo Center at 500 E County Road Y, Oshkosh, Wis.

Anyone who is experiencing symptoms of COVID-19 or has been in close contact with someone who has tested positive is encouraged to get tested. Testing is free and available to anyone five years of age and older. Contact a pediatrician or healthcare provider for children under five years of age. Symptoms of COVID-19 can include fever, cough, difficulty breathing, sore throat, runny nose, nausea, vomiting, diarrhea, headache, chills, muscle aches or loss of taste or smell.

To reduce wait times, it is highly recommended that you register ahead of time by completing the screening questionnaire at register.covidconnect.wi.gov. If multiple people in your family are being tested, the same email address can be used but a questionnaire must be completed for each individual.

While you are waiting for test results, it is critical that you isolate yourself from others to prevent spread of the virus should you test positive. Test results are typically received via email or phone within three to seven business days.

Additional information:

- Pre-registration is highly encouraged
- Antibody testing is not available
- No appointment is needed
- Drive through or walk-up testing
- A doctor's referral is not required
- Members of the Wisconsin National Guard will conduct the testing
- Language translation is available
- Minors must be accompanied by a parent or guardian who can consent to the testing

This COVID-19 regional testing site was made possible through a collaboration between the Wisconsin Army National Guard and the health departments and emergency management teams from the City of Menasha, City of Appleton, Calumet County, Outagamie County and Winnebago County.
